His debut novel, *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*, was a critical and commercial sensation that was followed soon after by his most substantial and ambitious book, *Sometimes a Great Notion*. His other books, including *Demon Box*, *Sailor Song*, and two children's books, appeared amidst a life of astounding influence. These conversations make clear Kesey's central place in American culture and offer his enduring lesson that the freedom exists to create lives as wildly as can be imagined.
